MINUTES

Of the Regular Meeting of The Claiborne Parish Police Jury January 13, 2016 Homer, LA 71040

The Claiborne Parish Police Jury met in regular session in the Jury Chambers of the Police Jury Complex, located at 507 West Main Street in Homer, LA at 10:00 a.m. on the Thirteenth day of January 2016. On being called to order by Secretary-Treasurer Dwayne Woodard, the following jurors were present:

The meeting was opened with a word of Prayer led Rev. Willie Young, Sr., followed by the Pledge of Allegiance led by Paul Cook.

At this time, Secretary-Treasurer Dwayne R. Woodard turned the meeting over to Clerk of Court Brian Flynn for Juror's to be sworn in and sit as members of the Claiborne Parish Police Jury.

Secretary-Treasurer Dwayne Woodard stated that the Police Jury would now move to the business of nominating officers for the 2016 year.

At this time, Secretary-Treasurer Woodard opened the floor for nominations for President. Paul Cook nominated Scott Davidson, seconded by Kevin Gray. Mark Furlow moved that the nominations for President be closed, which was duly seconded by Joe Sturges. Scott Davidson was elected by acclamation, President of the Police Jury for the 2016 calendar year.

At this time Secretary-Treasurer Dwayne R. Woodard, turned the meeting over to President Scott Davidson.

President Scott Davidson opened the floor for nominations for Vice-President. Gil Dowies nominated Mark Furlow, seconded by Joe Sturges. Joe Sturges moved to close the floor to nominations for Vice President, which was seconded by Gil Dowies. Mark Furlow was elected by acclamation, Vice President of the Police Jury for the 2016 calendar year.

Upon motion by Gill Dowies, duly seconded by Mark Furlow, the Jury unanimously voted to adopt the Regular agenda as presented.

Upon motion by Paul Cook, duly seconded by Joe Sturges, the Jury unanimously voted to amend the regular agenda and add the following:

ORDINANCE NO. 780

AN ORDINANCE ADOPTING AN OPERATING BUDGET OF REVENUE AND EXPENDITURES FOR THE FISCAL YEAR BEGINNING JANUARY 1, 2016 AND ENDING ON DECEMBER 31, 2016

BE IT ORDAINED by the Police Jury of Claiborne Parish, Louisiana, in a regular called session, the Ordinance adopting an Operating Budget for Revenues and Expenditures for the fiscal year beginning January 1, 2016 and ending December 31, 2016.

AN ORDINANCE CONSOLIDATING ELECTION PRECINCTS 22 AND 31 FOR CLAIBORNE PARISH, LOUISIANA AND CHANGING THE POLLING PLACE OF PRECINCT 31

WHEREAS, the Louisiana Revised Statute 18:532.1(B)(2)(a) states that precincts may be consolidated with adjacent precincts for the purpose of satisfying the requirement regarding the minimum number of registered voters per precinct;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED by the Claiborne Parish Police Jury, that the following polling places are hereby designated and election precincts are hereby created through the consolidation of certain existing election precincts and shall become effective for all purposes on the first day of March, 2016, or upon receiving preclearance of said consolidation from the United States Department of Justice, whichever shall occur later.
